## Mrs Cliff's Comments

### **Wider Opening**

June has been very different in school this year as normally it is the busiest month with all the final year assessments and records of achievements being completed as well as the planning of the end of term events such as the Summer Fayre, Sports Day and Leavers BBQ. We have been welcoming back some of our pupils in Reception, Year 1 and from Monday next week, Year 6 children as well as a greater number of Key Worker children.

Reception and Year 1 children have now returned, albeit on a part time basis. It has been wonderful seeing more and more children back in the building and the children have been skipping up the path each day looking forward to their day. Parents have reported that the children are so happy to be back in school and are very tired when they return home and getting a good night's sleep again. It is reassuring that the measures we have worked hard to put in place to ensure the safety and well-being of the children are helping to ease parents' anxieties about their children coming into school and the one way system and staggered drop off/pick up times are working well.

This month we have increased our capacity for Key Worker children from two bubbles to now having five bubbles each day. The teachers who have taken responsibility for the teaching of the Key Worker children have been dedicated to not only focus on the learning, but also on the well-being of the

children; being in school when some of their friends are learning from home has been very difficult for some children. The Key Worker children in the Year 4/5 bubble last week focused their learning around the book 'The Promise' by Nicola Da-

vies. The story is about a girl who plants acorns to brighten up the city and turn it from black and white to colour. It is a story which the children could relate to at this difficult time and linked the learning to

linked the learning to looking at the natural environment within the school grounds and using identification keys to identify what trees we have growing. The Year 6 Key Worker children have also been busy completing their transition activities but also creating a huge model tree out of chicken wire and Modroc; apologies to the parents for the white trousers and trainers but the children had an amazing time and it made a difference from the intensity of the learning which has taken place all year for the Year 6 children although last week they were given £5 million pounds to design a theme park and budget the costs involved. Questions raised and debates took place over whether you should buy more bins or employ someone to pick up litter.

Our youngest children have also been busy learning about different traditional tales such as "The Three Billy Goats Gruff" and "Goldilocks and the Three Bears". They have made porridge following a simple recipe as well as making character masks and retelling the story.

The KS1 key worker children have been following the learning journey 'What does it feel like to be beside the seaside?'. They have been reading the book 'The Lighthouse Keep-
