
Book of the Month

PASS Survey

As we approach the end of the year, we have continued to seek the children's views of school. This has been an ongoing survey which we have completed bi-annually since 2016. Throughout the last 7 years, we have monitored closely the views of the children and as always, the results this term are not a surprise as there is a pattern, and they mirror what is happening in the academy and the priorities. The results this term again reflect an overall positive picture of the academy and there are only one or two individuals which have disagreed with a majority of comments. The happiest children in school are the children within Key Stage 1 with an average of 98% children responding positively to all the comments. The lowest percentage in all the responses was again about home learning – 84%. Home learning is always a controversial one as many children do not want to do things at home. This could be because of wanting to keep school at school and home at home. Interestingly the percentage of children who responded negatively, increases through Key Stage 2 until Year 6 when it looks like they see a purpose to home learning - 2% in Year 3, 6% in Year 4, 16% in Year 5 and 6% in Year 6. The children in Nursery and Reception have fewer questions to respond to and these are tailored so that they are age appropriate and child friendly. The overall percentage of responses was 97%. There were three questions with 100% positivity; learning is interesting, adults I can talk to and feeling safe in school.

Pupil voice is so important for the children so that they feel valued and listened to and forms part of the academy's improvement agenda. As well as the bi-annual survey, pupils' voice is continually sought from the children through a number of strategies that are in place. These include promoting the children's right to a voice through the Rights Respecting Schools agenda and Student Leadership Teams.

Keeping Your Children Safe

As parents are aware, we had a fire incident in school where all the children were evacuated safely. We have been complemented on our fire procedures and swift actions taken by leaders to ensure the safety of the children and the Key Stage 2 children have experienced a fire safety assembly.

Following on from this, we have been working closely with South Yorkshire Fire Service to review our procedures in school as well as offer education for our children.
